



From the Mayor... How Does Youngtown's Government Work?

"...It has been said, Democracy is the worst form of Government in the world, except for all the rest..."

This is a paraphrase of a comment made by Winston Churchill in the British House of Commons in 1947.

In other words, since government is a necessary evil, better to have one that actually allows the people to have a say in how they will be governed.

Of course, here in America, our governments, federal, state and local are all actually representative republics in form, not direct democracies.

In Youngtown, residents elect a mayor, who acts as the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) and six Town Council members, all elected at-large, to represent them in governing the Town. Youngtown, like every other municipality in Arizona, has adopted a Council/Manager form of government. The Town Council acts as a legislative policy making and fiduciary body and hires a professional Town Manager to act as the Chief Operating Officer (COO). This COO oversees and manages the day-to-day operations of the Town, discharging policies and



overseeing activities of staff.

The myriad functions of Youngtown's daily operations like public safety and infrastructure

design, construction and maintenance are financed through various streams of revenue.

Youngtown's residents do not pay any taxes,

such as property taxes, to support these operations. Youngtown's two main sources of revenue are: 1) state-shared revenue (sales and

income taxes collected by the State of Arizona and remanded back to local governments based on population) and 2) local sales tax brought in through the activities of Youngtown's businesses.

All activities of the Town Council, including policy and fiduciary decisions, are done in public meetings. Agendas of all public meetings are prominently posted, in advance. Minutes, or records of those meetings, are transcribed and maintained.

Executive Sessions, conducted in camera, are only allowed to discuss and seek legal advice or to discuss specific personnel issues. No decisions may be made, by the Town Council, in Executive Session.

In coming months, I will be asking the Town Council to consider the possibility of designating Youngtown as a 'Charter Municipality'. A Town charter, in theory, would give its residents substantially more control over how their government operates. The road to a municipal charter, as laid out in the Arizona constitution, would eventually require a vote of the residents before adoption. I'll talk more about this as we move forward.



Sometimes a mistake is a good thing, depending on which side of the “OOPS” you are on. Recently, I was called to investigate a fire in Sun City which was curious to the responding Firefighters. It turns out that a duplex was having its roof covering replaced and a fire had been discovered during

the process. As the interviews discovered, a roofing company hired a “tear-off” company to remove the existing asphalt shingles so the roofing company could come behind and replace the roof covering. During the process of removing the old roof covering, the tear-off crew noticed some smoke coming out of the attic. The crew proceeded to take off some plywood sheathing to get to the source of the smoke. They saw no flame, just a small amount of smoke. After removing some sheathing, they used a “green-line” (garden hose) to spray into the attic. This caused

additional smoke to come out, so they called 911. Our Engine companies arrived with the Battalion Chief Command vehicle. Now you need to know, whenever there is a working residential fire, the common practice is to dispatch a minimum of three Engine companies and a Ladder company in addition to the Battalion Chief Command vehicle and possibly additional equipment. All of this apparatus was dispatched, however some of it was recalled after the first engine on scene realized it wasn’t an out-of-control working fire. The engine companies on the

roof began removing additional sheets of plywood to try to discover the fire origin. That is when I arrived on-scene. At first glance this was a puzzling flame spread, because there was no flame; however there were multiple burn patterns on top of the blown-in cellulose insulation. The burn pattern only went over the surface of the insulation. So we started tracing the burn pattern from least burn to most burn and found the source near the ductwork where the Air Conditioning unit that was located on the roof, came through the attic into the house. For

some reason, several electrical wires were stretched tight over the trusses (wooden roof supporting members) and charred some wooden components as the insulation melted off the wiring. This caused a smoldering fire which followed the flexible metallic-covered ductwork and continued to burn the surface of the insulation in various patterns throughout the attic area. The fire crews and I moved the insulation away from the “hot spots” on the wood framing members to assure the fire would not be restarted. This all seems somewhat

unremarkable, however the facts of the fire discovery are what is interesting. It turns out, that the roof tear-off crew accidentally went to the wrong address and tore the roof covering off the wrong house. The house they were supposed to be working on was a few blocks away. The interesting take-away from this event is obvious. Had the roofing crew not gone to the wrong house, the initial stages of attic fire may not have been discovered, and we could have had a significant attic fire in this duplex. Sometimes an “OOPS” isn’t.

happen in the Phoenix area, does have some challenges. As you know, the Phoenix area valley is largely comprised of flat terrain with vast amounts of ever-increasing asphalt, concrete and roof-tops. The soil consists largely of hard caliche dirt; you know just how hard the soil is, if you've ever dug a hole in your yard. When a large volume of rain falls over a short time period on all this asphalt, concrete and hard soil, a great deal of run off occurs due to slow saturation, causing some street flooding. If there is street flooding, barricades may be placed to block off the street. Driving around barricades is illegal and dangerous, so don't do it. If the street crews have not had the chance to set out barricades before the street floods, don't risk driving through the flood, turn around, don't drown! Roadbeds may be washed out under floodwaters. As little as ten inches of water can float average-sized cars, minivans, SUVs, and trucks. Strength of the flow is the critical force. When in doubt, wait it out, or find a safer route. Do not let

children play near storm drains or washes after a heavy rain. Floodwater can be filled with toxic chemicals such as oil, gasoline, pet and human waste and other contaminants such as pesticides and chemicals.

If the potential for flooding is in the forecast, the Town will provide, at no cost, sand, and sand bags for residents. The sand yard is located just west and adjacent to the Public Works Facility at 11117 W. Peoria Avenue and is stocked with sand and sand bags. The gate to the yard is unlocked. Please avoid driving into the yard, as you could get stuck. Park outside of the gate on the hard gravel. Bring your own shovel to fill the sand bags provided. Only fill each bag a little over half full to two thirds full as they work best that way. Please be considerate and only take what you need - your neighbors will appreciate it. Make sure to close the gate when you exit the sand yard. In the event you drive into the sand yard and get stuck, the driver of the vehicle will be responsible for having the vehicle removed from

the sand yard.

Speaking of water, Youngtown has a lake! Maricopa Lake is owned and maintained by the Town as an amenity for the citizens of Youngtown to enjoy. The lake is 2.76 acres in size. At approximately 4 feet in average depth, the lake has 11.2-acre feet volume or 3.65 million gallons. The lake is supplied with potable water from EP-COR water. The lake has several methods in which to keep the water clean. There is a recirculation pump which continuously recirculates the water from the north end intake to the south end outlet system. There is an aeration system along with two decorative water features which also pro-

vide aeration. The water features provide an auditory soothing ambiance with the water drops dancing on the lake water. Scientific studies have shown that the sound of falling water diminishes depression, increases mental clarity, and provides for an overall sense of well-being. Feeling down? Go for a leisurely stroll or an invigorating walk around the lake and see if you don't feel better when you're done. The lake has several varieties of fish, including catfish, perch, and shad. Catch and release fishing is allowed and, by the way, the fishing is excellent. Shhh! Don't tell anyone. Be careful while you are fishing, you may be lulled to sleep by the relaxing

sound of the water fountains and miss the big fish that just took your bait. Sorry, but swimming is not allowed. Turtles and ducks reside in the lake. Migratory birds, such as geese will make seasonal appearances. Sometimes as many as three or four dozen can be seen at the lake. You will need to visit just before and after sunrise in order to see the geese. When the sun rises, they fly off to who knows where, only to return after dark. Get out this winter, go for a stroll on the new sidewalks around the lake and enjoy the beauty of this Town amenity. The Town has several other parks to enjoy, so make sure to get out this winter.
