MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING COMMON COUNCIL OF YOUNGTOWN, AZ 12033 N. CLUBHOUSE SQUARE, TOWN COUNCIL CHAMBERS THURSDAY, JUNE 17, 2021 at 5:30 P.M.

- 1. <u>Call to Order:</u> Mayor LeVault called the meeting to order at 5:37 p.m. Immediately following the Agua Fria Ranch Community Facilities District Board Meeting.
- 2. Roll Call: Council present: Mayor Michael LeVault, Vice Mayor Chuck Vickers, Council Members, Margaret Chittenden, June Miller. Councilmember present telephonically: Councilmember Susan Hout and Councilmember Karen Haney Duncan.

Mayor Michael LeVault noted that a quorum is established for transacting business.

Staff present: Town Manager Jeanne Blackman, Town Attorney Trish Stuhan, Library Manager Heidi Speed, and Town Clerk Nicole Smart. Staff present telephonically Court Clerk Lisa Lipinski, and Community Development Manager Gregory Arrington.

3. <u>Pledge of Allegiance and Invocation:</u> Vice Chair Vickers led the Pledge and Town Manager Blackman gave the Invocation.

4. Summary of Current Events:

A. Summary of Current Events from Mayor and Council.

Mayor LeVault mentioned there was a memorial for Pastor Jack Duran, a long-time councilmember. Pastor Duran had been on council for eighteen years, and he will be dearly missed.

Mayor LeVault stated the homeless issue is everywhere, as bad as you may think it is here, it's worse in other States. People should watch "Seattle is Dying" and how bad it can actually get, as it's out of control in Seattle. The Maricopa Association of Governments is trying to find a way to put their arms around the homelessness issue.

Mayor LeVault mentioned that he is taking another trip down in the river bottom tomorrow. The Town cleaned up the river bottom over a year ago. El Mirage is not as aggressive in cleaning up their side. Mayor LeVault spent over one hundred hours in the river bottom. The homeless people have a mental issue, drug and opioid addiction. We are taking steps to mitigate this issue. If we were allowed to unvoluntary commit them then we may be able to wrap our arms around this issue.

Mayor LeVault mentioned the petty crime happening in this State. They are stealing catalytic converters and selling them for drugs, and there are porch pirates stealing packages on the front porches. Mayor LeVault stated he hasn't heard that is happening in town; however, it is happening in other places.

Mayor LeVault mentioned when you call the non-emergency number you may think the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office is not responding, however, the calls are prioritized, and it may take a few hours for them to respond but they do. Emergency calls come first and they are prioritized as well. Maricopa County Sherriff's Office is under staffed, and over worked, as are many law enforcement agencies throughout this state and across the country. This community will need to help us, and start standing up and pushing back. We are looking at our citizens' starting a neighborhood watch in different areas of the Town. Also, please do not put yourself in harm's way with the homeless people, call 911.

Town Attorney Stuhan stated being homeless is not a crime or illegal. If there were shelters space for the homeless to go to, and we offer to take them, and they refuse then there are other steps the Town can take to rectify that. However, the state is short of shelters, homes and services for the homeless people.

Councilmember Chittenden mentioned personally she will miss Pastor Duran he was a very committed, courteous person. Whomever replaces Pastor Duran, they will have big shoes to fill. Councilmember Chittenden stated they are having a Dog Park Meeting this Saturday, at 11:00 a.m. in the Clubhouse Kitchen. Also, the shade covers should be installed soon for the dog park.

Town Manager Blackman met with Mayor LeVault, Town Engineer Grant Anderson, Fire Marshal Jim Fox along with Community Development Manager Arrington and Town Clerk Smart regarding outstanding issues on the El Sol Battery Storage Facility project.

Town Manager Blackman met with Mayor LeVault and Captain Stutsman on issues in the community.

Town Manager Blackman met with Suzanne Baier, MCSO Finance along with Captain Stutsman to discuss additional law enforcement services for Youngtown.

Town Manager Blackman met with Mayor LeVault and Regional Manager for QuikTrip to discuss issues within our community and potential collaboration on working together on areas of concern.

Town Manager Blackman mentioned the street slurry seal resurfacing will begin on June 18th and will be completed by June 25th. The Citizens' Dog Park section of Alabama Ave. is scheduled for slurry seal on the northside lane on June 18th. The southside lane of Alabama Ave. adjacent to the Citizens' Dog Park will be slurry sealed on June 21st.

Library Manager Speed mentioned the library has started story time which will be held on Wednesday mornings at 11:00 a.m. They are participating in the Maricopa County Summer Reading Program for all ages, (pre-readers, children, teens, and adults), and they have supplied us with the game boards and prizes.

The Story Time attendees sign up and receive a prize. The library is working on developing a Youngtown Historical Society and looking for members to honor and preserve our past. The library will be holding their annual ice cream social on Wednesday, July 28th from 12:00 pm – 1:00 pm, outside the library.

7. Citizens Comments/Appearances from the Floor:

Citizen Betty Trollen would like to say thank you to the Town for cleaning up the north end of the lake as this was a hangout for the homeless people. Let the Town know when you see something that they can resolve, please call the Town or 911. Also, we have a person that lives around Maricopa Lake that keeps an eye on everything there.

Greg Eisert from Sun City Homeowners Association (SCHOA.) Greg Eisert stated that Youngtown has been a partner with SCHOA in the past in the efforts opposing the forced consolidation of water and wastewater districts, which result in discriminatory and unjust rates to members of the communities. Since the decision of the Arizona Corporation Commission to forcibly consolidate five (5) wastewater districts, our citizens and theirs have been subsidizing the rates of four (4) other districts, including a financial contribution toward their legal costs.

While SCHOA lost (2-1) the appeal at the Appeal court, the dissenting opinion was so strong and persuasive that SCHOA submitted a Petition for Review to the Arizona Supreme Court. On March 3rd of this year the Supreme Court ordered a review of their Petition.

They continue to feel that forced consolidation is wrong, results in discriminatory rates, and it ignores the principle of cost causation as a basis for fair rates. They feel their positions in the Petition are strong, and they are optimistic that the court will find in their favor.

Greg Eisert stated that there are five (5) districts, and they were consolidated into one, and one of the districts was us. Of the five (5) districts, there are only two (2) districts that are continuing with the lawsuit - one is Youngtown and the other is Sun City West. We are hoping by the end of the year we will have an answer.

D. Presentation and/or Discussion Re: Sun City Fire and Medical District (SCFD) Report, which may include discussion of inspections, fire prevention, staffing levels, response times, community needs, and ambulance services.

Fire Marshall Rob Schmidt presented the May 2021 Sun City Fire and Medical District monthly reports, discussion followed including inspections, fire preventions, expenses, and response times.

Fire Marshall Rob Schmidt mentioned that one of the fire engines needs to be updated, and they need to purchase an ambulance due to capital needs. Sun City Fire Department is asking if the Town would be willing to help them in purchasing the ambulance which has a cost of \$240,000, as they need to start replacing the ambulance they have, with some of the recovery act money that the Town would be receiving. Sun City Fire Department did receive some Cares money from Maricopa County for the sick time however, not for the overtime.

Mayor LeVault asked how much would it cost to purchase a fully furnished ambulance.

Fire Marshall stated a fully furnished ambulance would cost \$240,000.

Mayor LeVault explained the American Relief money coming is one time money, which the Town would be getting this fiscal year, and next year. Mayor LeVault would like everyone to consider this matter at a future meeting to discuss helping Sun City Fire and Medical District purchase the additional ambulance.

Councilmember Miller mentioned there's a lot of brush fires going on, and driving around Town she has noticed there a lot of tall weeds in people's backyard and in the alley way, and inquired if that would be a cause for fires.

Fire Marshall Schmidt mentioned that any dry bush could cause fire. From people throwing their cigarettes, or sparks from chains that are dragging on the road.

Councilmember Chittenden asked if the 399 calls for service included all Cities and Towns in our area, and when is your next meeting and at what time does it start.

Fire Marshall Schmidt mentioned the 399 calls includes all the calls they went to. The next Sun City Fire Department Board meeting is on the 4th Tuesday of the month, and it starts at 9:30 a.m., which is located at 99th Avenue and Bell.

Presentation and/or Discussion Re: Maricopa County Sheriff's Office (MCSO) Report, which may include discussion of crime statistics, specific crimes including traffic violations, thefts, violent crimes, trespass and issues with homelessness, crime prevention, MCSO staffing levels, community needs, and response times.

Captain Stutsman mentioned today was a very rough day, and he is very proud of his deputies and everyone that helped out during the mass shooter. There were thirteen people that got shot at today, and one person passed away. When we received the 911 call, we are running to the scene as most people are fleeing from the danger. We worked with Surprise Police Department, Arizona Department of Public Safety. and I'm so proud to be part of this community and do what we do. The Surprise Police Department has the suspect in custody. The entire incident took place over an hour and half from 103rd Avenue to West Northern Avenue, Loop 101 to Thunderbird Road, 109th Avenue to West Union Hills Drive, 111th Avenue to West Union Hills Drive, 113th Avenue to West Bell Road, 21800 North El Mirage Road, and Loop 303 to Happy Valley Road.

Captain Stutsman reviewed the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office May 2021 monthly reports, discussion followed including review of crime statistics, crimes including traffic violations, thefts, violent crimes, trespass and issues with the homelessness, and the Flock Safety cameras.

Captain Stutsman stated if you see something, please say something. Call 911 or the non-emergency number.

Councilmember Miller asked if the person that passed away was one of their own deputies.

Captain Stutsman stated there were no deputies or police officers injured, it was a member of the community.

Citizen Tim Ayres wanted to say thank and that he appreciates everything the Captain Stutsman and Deputy Hagen have done and the guidance they have given for the neighborhood watch program. They started the neighborhood watch a couple of weeks ago, and have 43 residents attending the neighborhood watch meeting. This includes both Spanish Gardens and River Bend 2.

Councilmember Haney Duncan asked if Denny's had any other break-ins.

Captain Stutsman stated there were no other break-ins.

Councilmember Hout wanted to extend her gratitude and thank you for everything they do.

Citizen Sandra Hankle mentioned she lives in El Mirage. They have an issue in regards to homeless people in El Mirage and she doesn't know what she needs to do and who does she reach out to. They just found out the Town of Youngtown has cleaned up the river bottom, and El Mirage has not done anything. Can you advise us who we should speak with?

Mayor LeVault mentioned the Town cleaned up our side of the river bottom a couple of years ago and we are maintaining it. You will need to attend a Council meeting and speak to your Mayor in El Mirage. Mayor LeVault mentioned don't give money to the panhandlers.

Vice Mayor Vickers mentioned the homeless people know the law more than we think. A lot of the homeless people made this life style, and they know what they are doing.

Town Manager Blackman mentioned it's encouraging to see people come together to try and fix this issue. We are in this together.

Mayor LeVault mentioned that a town this size should not have a police force. The Town finance consultant did a report, and it showed that it would cost more than six million dollars to start up the police force. This does not include all the other equipment that would be needed that is currently provided by the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office for law enforcement services.

Also, since we do not pay a town property tax, the finance consultant provided each council member with how much it would cost them for new property taxes to start up a police force. The property taxes would be - for Mayor LeVault \$2,800.83, for Vice Mayor Vickers \$1,479.34, Councilmember Duran \$2,604.65, Councilmember Miller \$1,277.04, Councilmember Haney Duncan \$1,563.65, Councilmember Hout \$1,390.81 and Councilmember Chittenden \$1.373.98. Mayor LeVault mentioned that no one is paying property taxes in Youngtown.

Councilmember Miller mentioned when we asked the Youngtown Police to speak with the citizens in regards to keeping the police department, they did not want to do that.

Betty Trollen inquired when we might be getting additional law enforcement services.

Mayor LeVault mentioned the Town is negotiating with Maricopa County Sheriff's Office to amend the contract.

Councilmember Jim Trollen asked why can't the Town use the contingency to pay for another deputy.

Town Manager Blackman explained the contingency is in place for emergency. The Town has added \$300,000 in the public safety budget for the additional law enforcement resources.

Councilmember Chittenden mentioned when she was an officer years back, they used Maricopa County Sheriff's Office services, and they can offer so much more than the Youngtown Police Department ever could. Councilmember Chittenden mentioned life has changed since many years ago. We asked the residents to support the property tax and they did not want to. It was a very sad night when we closed the Youngtown Police Department, however, Maricopa County Sheriff's Office can offer a lot more than the Youngtown Police could ever do.

Councilmember Hout mentioned we all worked hard in regards to the homelessness issues.

Citizen Bob Ferrara mentioned he educated himself and it's true that the town can't afford a police force, and MCSO is offering the town a lot more than the police force we had and they are doing a good job.

What is paid in taxes has two components: one is the rate of taxation, the other the valuation of properties. If property valuations go up, then the tax rate goes down and if property valuations go down, then the tax rate goes up.

The Maricopa County Assessor supplies valuations for the AFR SLID in February and those valuations are used to calculate the tax levy for the SLID. These valuations can change in the days before the tax levy report goes to the Maricopa County Board of Supervisors.

Fiscal year 2020-2021 estimated cost is \$24,342.98. Ad valorem tax is levied and collected based on the assessed valuation of all the real and personal property within the AFR SLID.
